Maybe it would be good if you could write a page for the group about how you effect this warm-up. Practically, what do you do? If you do write something I will make sure each of us gets a copy.

By now some of you will be asking " *what is this NLP- we have done a whole day and no one has yet told us?* "

It is hard to give a brief and clear answer to this reasonable question, because, like an octopus, NLP has many arms.

Let me have a go, all the same.

NLP is a synthesis and development of many of the main therapy traditions of the 20th century, particularly of these areas: Moreno's psychodrama

Perl's Gestalt therapy

Milton Erickson's hypnotherapy.

NLP also draws on insights and borrowings from other fields, to wit cybernetics, or the study of systems and Chomskyan linguistics.

The applications of NLP are to be found in therapy, police training, business management training (eg Robert Dilt's work in the early 90's with Fiat senior management) , selling, politics (eg Haider, the Governor of Carinthia in Austria) and education. Our main concern on this course is the application of NLP to teaching and to language teaching.

Most of the rest of today will be given over to explaining, with in-depth examples, why NEURO?

why LINGUISTIC?

why PROGRAMMING?

M■■■■ will lead us into the NEURO area with a clear, concrete example.
